Re: COMPLAINT - RCMP ATI FILES: GA-1516-3-03285/13 and A-2013-03285

Please find a attached a copy of my original request to the RCMP dated May 20, 2013 and a copy of the RCMP's pitiful response dated October 9, 2013 that I received today.

I wish to complain about the complete lack of any current financial information about what it costs taxpayers to operate the Canadian Firearms Program, including the RCMP's failure to provide any information regarding the number of employees working in and for the firearms program. The last year this information was available to Parliament and the public was 2008/2009.

Just because the RCMP no longer provides reports to Parliament on what they spend annually on the Canadian Firearms Program doesn't mean that the information isn't available to the public. I used to work for a federal department and I can assure your investigators that the directors of each of the six main organizational sections and supervisors for each of the thirteen sub-sections itemized in the RCMP's Organizational Charts and noted in my request, has submitted a budget to the RCMP brass and filed reports documenting their fiscal and operational performance at the end of the most recent fiscal year. These reports would also include the number of employees working in each section and sub-section. They would prepare these reports just as if the RCMP Commissioner was going to someday be held accountable in Parliament for the tax dollars he spends on the Canadian Firearms Program and the results he achieved with these dollars. The RCMP Commissioner also needs this information to properly manage and staff the program.

The reports are in their files but for some reason the RCMP Commissioner no longer wants them to be made available to either Parliament, the public or the media. I wonder why?

Explanations:

- 1. Firearms licences are renewable every five years. On May 17, 2006, the Government waived the fee to renew a licence or modify licence privileges until May 17, 2008. As well, the fee to renew a minor's licence had been waived until May 17, 2008.
- 2. Fees to register firearms were waived by the Federal Government in May 2004.
- 3. A Non-resident firearms declaration, confirmed by a customs officer, is deemed to be a temporary licence valid for a period up to 60 days.
- 4. The methodology for planned consultations and review process pertaining to published standards needs to be reevaluated following transition of the CAFC into the RCMP.

In response to Recommendation 4.27 of the May 2006 Auditor General Report on the Canadian Firearms Program, direct and indirect costs are defined as follows:

Direct Costs: represent those reimbursed by CAFC to its partners for services/activities provided in support of the Program and agreed upon through a Memorandum of Agreement. **Indirect Costs:** certain costs of the Canadian Firearms Program incurred by federal partners that are not reimbursed by CAFC (see Auditor General Report – Definitions). Indirect costs can be sub-divided into two categories: those costs incurred and not reimbursed by the Centre. An example would be collective bargaining salary increases that are passed on to departments by Treasury Board or, overhead costs for ministerial or infrastructure support. Secondly, indirect

costs can be those that are received without charge such as accommodation and employee benefits to, for example, the Public Service Dental Plan.
